What are the benefits of street trees?

Healthy street trees can:

- Make the city more beautiful
- Increase property value
- Purify the air we breathe
- Create cool shady places during hot summers
- Reduce air conditioning bills
- Store carbon
- Provide habitat for birds and other wildlife
- Reduce stormwater runoff and erosion



Caring for your new street tree

Although planting, pruning, maintenance and replacement of street trees is the responsibility of the City of Mandurah, additional care by residents during the tree's establishment period is greatly appreciated.

To help your new tree and to ensure it grows into an attractive and healthy street tree, please remember to do the following:

1. Water your tree regularly

Your new street tree will require two to three buckets of water twice a week for the first six weeks, and regular watering during the first two summers or until the tree is established.

2. Apply wetting agent twice a year In spring and late summer sprinkle a wetting agent around the base of the tree and water in well.

3. Keep the grass and weeds awayGrass and weeds at the base of the tree will compete for water and nutrients so it is best

compete for water and nutrients so it is best to remove them and maintain mulch at the base (leaves make a natural mulch).

4. Protect your tree's trunk

Damage to a young tree's trunk by whipper snippers may cause ring barking of your young tree. Please avoid damage to your tree's trunk.

5. Avoid damage to your tree roots

Don't disturb the soil surface under the tree canopy as this will damage the roots. Avoid parking or storing heavy equipment and materials at the base of trees to prevent the compaction of soil reducing water infiltration.

6. Straighten stakes and check tree ties Re-stake, if required, to support your tree until it is established. Check and loosen tree ties as it grows.

Requests for street trees

The City of Mandurah offers free planting of street trees for your verge. Street trees are great for the community and environment. Trees contribute significantly to the local character of a community and street environment.

The City's role

- Selection and planting of street trees is in accordance with existing or intended street tree themes. The number, spacing and alignment of trees will be determined by the City's Landscape Services team.
- Pruning and removal of street trees can only be carried out by the City or City contractors.

The resident's role

- Enjoy all the benefits of having trees on your street verge.
- Care and maintenance of the verge adjacent to their property.
- Watering of street trees, especially over the first two summers is encouraged.
- Residents are not permitted to plant, ringbark, cut down, top, lop, remove, prune, transplant, fill or excavate around a tree, injure or wilfully destruct any street trees.
