

Mandurah at Christmas. Like many other children of my generation, I spent at least 1 Christmas period in Mandurah. I remember little of it except the caravan park we stayed in with an aunt and uncle. Mainly, I remember my younger brother and his obsession with the showers, at home we only had a chip heater so showering under automatic hot water was a real pleasure.

Fast forward until 1987, when both my husband and I, were feeling under stress due to being 'on call' for our jobs and needing some time out without a phone. We came here in January and rented a house on the estuary and loved it. In March we started looking for our own holiday home and found the right one and signed up on Mother's Day, now that was a special present.

Come Christmas that year and the small 2 garages separated by cement flooring and roofing over the whole area, was 'chock-a-block'. There was what we called 'the barn' out the back where most of the young ones slept. We had all the family, Grandparents, children, cousins etc. for Boxing Day lunch. Many continued to stay, and the place hummed with the sounds of plenty.

We found ourselves in love with Mandurah and like many others, decided to retire down here. We built a house in 1998, and it was finished in time to have our very first Christmas in our new home. My parents were both alive then and they joined us for it.

And then there was the dreaded Millenium Bug to overcome. All of us working at that time experienced the run up to this in different ways, my computer system at work was changed and upgraded. Everyone thought that planes would fall out of the air, trains would crash etc. We didn't host Christmas that year, it was our son's turn.

We did host New Year 2000. Because of all the hype behind it, none of the family wished to plan anything special but felt Mandurah would be safer than on the road coming home from parties. So, there we were, New Year's Eve, on the beach (just one block away) with nibbles and drinks watching the sun go down. There were 2 sons, 1 daughter, a daughter in law, and a son outlaw, plus our eldest grandson, just 2 years old, our grand-daughter was already waiting in the wings to always be the same age as the year. Strange to think that this Christmas, it was 25 years ago.

Returning to our home, we settled in for a bbq tea, with next door neighbours joining us. We spent the remainder of the night playing with a pinball machine which my

husband had bought especially for that occasion. That

machine was to spend many years entertaining us and friends. The eldest grandchildren grew up standing on stools playing with it.

Next morning New Year Day 2000, we greeted the sun again on the beach. As we walked out, we were greeted by the buck kangaroo and its mate who often drank the dew from either our lawn or the one next door. These kangaroos lived in the bush reserve opposite us. Sadly, we have not seen the kangaroos recently. I have had a recent experience with a local kangaroo. (Could it be waiting for the bus?)

Sunrise on New Year 2000 was glorious, and wonderful end to special family celebrations.

Boxing Day was to become our special meal as the family married and attempted to please all with their availability. Boxing Day was never and impost to us, it meant we could enjoy a small family meal on Christmas Day. Then have fun with the kids having fulfilled all their obligations the day before. As our sons and daughter became attached, their 'other half' appreciated not having to make the choice. We were not alone with this method and have for many years enjoyed the company of close friends, who also have their bigger gathering on Boxing Day. They now join us (or in turn we join them) for a special light meal together on Christmas Day.

And so, years moved on, with grandchildren grown or growing up, they have all considered Mandurah and Falcon as a particularly special place with lots of memories. Christmas 2022, our eldest son, wife, and grandchildren weren't going to be here and therefore our current home could house all the remainder. Changes were made so that we would once again host Christmas/ Boxing Day. We had fun on that day and were able to speak to the others way up there in Norway. They had just experienced the Northern Aurora.

Last year, due to physical changes causing me difficulties within the house and garden, plus a steep driveway, we decided we would need to downsize into a more suitable home. We also thought it would be more helpful to our children if we moved back closer to them in Perth. Sadly, that would mean leaving all our wonderful friends and community behind.

Need I say that once again, nostalgia took over and all the family felt we must have just one more Christmas in Mandurah. This time the eldest brought down his caravan and we expanded into that. It was a wonderful Christmas, and I am so pleased to have this one last memory of our 'Family Treasure' which was the Mandurah Christmas House.

The number of students visiting our museum on an excursion was 922 this year. This number is lower compared to last year however we had 18 different schools from the Peel Region and beyond visit. Two schools that hadn't previously visited and travelled the greatest distance were from St Anne's School in Harvey and North Dandalup Primary School.

This year we had an increase of children visiting our museum to participate in a holiday activity. We had 843 children come to design, create and discover something new. The most popular activity were the hunts which included solving a puzzle.

The touring photographic exhibition from the Australian National Maritime Museum, "Cats & Dogs-All at Sea" was my favourite exhibition this year. I loved the photographs and the short stories that accompanied them. I thought the artwork produced by James Walker's RT Kids was stunning. 
Volunteer Outing and Lunch


On Monday 25th November, 12 museum volunteers and staff went on our last outing for the year.

Moving on he talked about the general evolution of the Fenian movement. He also spoke a little about their history in the Americas, including Canada where they conducted military raids.

Fenians were present in Fremantle (as they were in the Eastern States) prior to the arrival of the Fenian prisoners, and there was concern in the general population of Perth with a request for the provision of a Man O War' vessel to protect them prior to the arrival of the convicts.

Chairpersons' Report – 2024. Firstly, I would like to welcome you all to this AGM, and in particular to welcome Adam Bassett-Scarfe our patron. Rather than thank the Committee at the end of this report, I want to place them front and centre to say how much they have dug in and assisted me over the past year. Like all the committees I have worked with over the past 15 plus years they have fulfilled their role and more. For me the past year has been a bit topsy turvey and we have had several meetings cancelled. Nevertheless, business has continued as usual with our Treasurer Christine Steer, and Secretary Debbie Stasiw, undertaking all requirements with assistance of the 2024 committee.

Our eftpos machine continues to be a great benefit both to the Friends and as a support to the Museum itself, as without it, many of the books sold by the museum would not be, due to so many people only using a card for purchases. We have recently reprinted the Footprints book which continues to sell a small amount each 6-8 weeks. Currently we now print and publish this in house, saving expensive printing costs and therefore lowering the cost of the book.

With funds raised from Membership fees, book sales and other items we have supported the museum by recently purchasing a new A3 scanner as the one previously purchased by the Friends is no longer fit for purpose. Together with this we also bought a portable digital projector for the Museum Development Officer Nicholas Reynolds who gives talks off the museum site. Very early in the year, the committee purchased a seven-year-old child model for the exhibition being held in March. Very soon after that we had a chance to purchase 2 children's models (headless) from a shop which was closing. They were a real bargain, and we decided to take both of them. They have been used in displays since then.

Finally, as many of you know, this is my last year assisting on the Committee. I will however continue to be a Friend (in absence and by membership contribution.) Due to health problems both for my husband and myself we have shifted back to Perth. We purchased a house back in my childhood suburb of Bassendean, not too far from all our family. We moved just on a month ago and are busy unpacking and coming to terms with a different life. I will miss the friends I have made, both within the community and especially at the museum where I have volunteered for more than 20 years. Thank you all for making this such a wonderful time.
