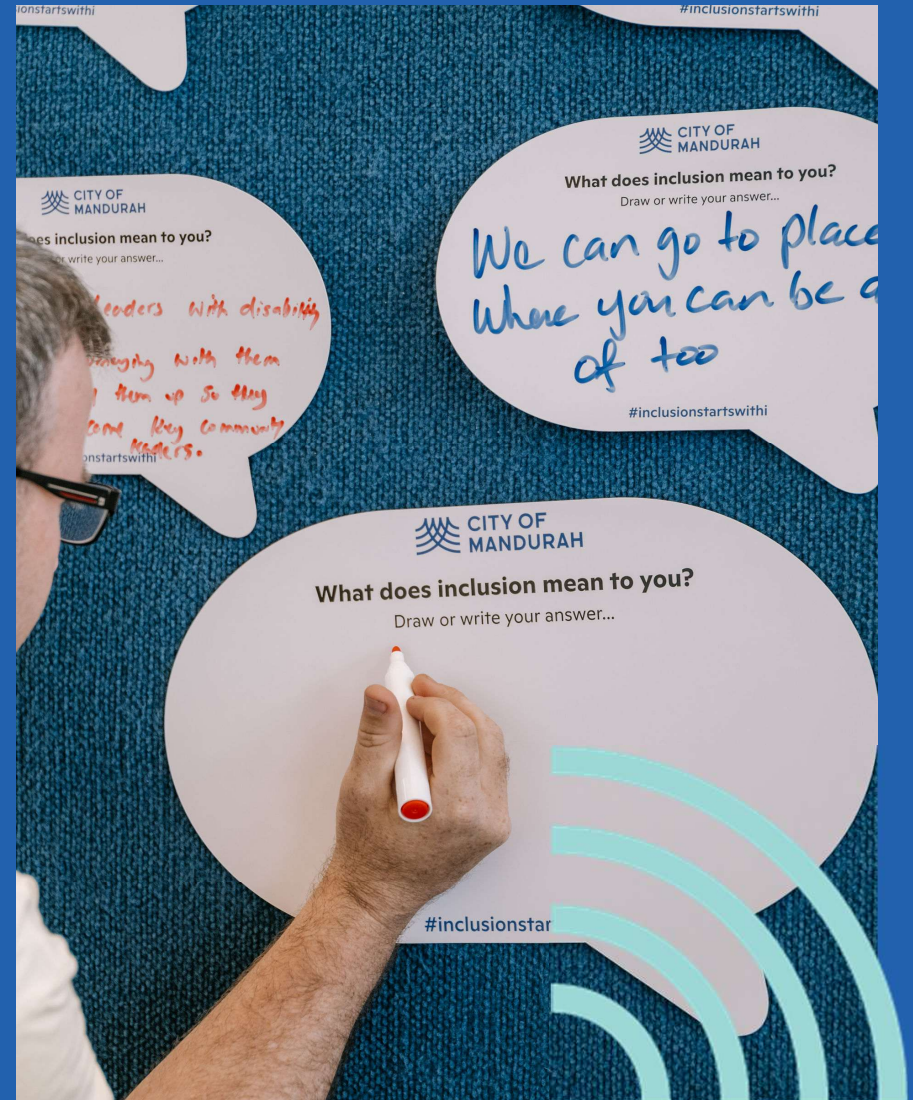


Visual Story

About this visual story

This visual story has been created to support people attending an Access and Inclusion Plan 2026-31 workshop.

It explains what to expect during the in-person workshops and helps people feel prepared and comfortable before attending.



What is an Access and Inclusion Plan

An Access and Inclusion Plan (AIP) is a five-year plan that helps the City of Mandurah make the community more accessible and inclusive for people with disability.

It is required under the Disability Services Act 1993 (WA) and guides how the City improves access to places, information, services and jobs.



About the workshops

The City of Mandurah is creating its next Access and Inclusion Plan for 2026 to 2031.

These workshops are a chance to share your ideas and experiences about access and inclusion for people with disability.

Everyone is welcome to take part and help shape a more accessible Mandurah.



Dates and Times

There are a range of workshop dates, times and venues so you can choose what works best for you.

- 13 November, 10am to 12pm - Falcon Library and Community Centre
- 19 November, 1pm to 3pm - Lakelands Library and Community Centre
- 20 November, 10am to 12pm - Mandurah Bowling Club
- 26 November, 4pm to 6pm - Online session

What will be discussed

The workshops are about how we can make Mandurah easier to access and more inclusive for people with disability.

You can share what's working well, what could be better, and your big ideas for the future.

We'll talk about everyday things like services, public spaces, information, customer service, employment and how people connect with the City.



Who will be at the workshops

The workshops will bring together people with different ideas and experiences.

We hope to hear from people with disability, family members, support workers, service providers, and our wider community including sporting and volunteer organisations.



Arrival and registration

Staff will welcome attendees when they arrive and help people sign in to the workshop room.

Name tags will be available. People can ask questions or request assistance at any time.



What will happen in the workshops

A facilitator will lead each session and start with a short talk about the Access and Inclusion Plan.

There will be different activities for you to be a part of. You can join group discussions with flashcards, write ideas on sticky notes for our feedback tree, or use mindful colouring sheets to share your thoughts.

Everyone can join in the way that feels best for them.



Breakout spaces and sensory supports

Each venue has areas away from the main workshop space that people can use for a short break if needed.

Sensory resources will be available for use including fidget tools and mindful colouring.



Tea, coffee and snacks

Tea, coffee, water and light snacks like fruit and cake will be available at each workshop.



Parking and access

Each venue has ACROD parking, a flat surface entry, a unisex Universal Access Toilet, and male and female toilets.
