What is a visual story?

This visual story has been created to support people attending the Autism community workshop. The workshop is titled 'Valuing Neurodiversity in Our Community'.

World Autism Month

April is World Autism Month, a time to recognise and celebrate the diversity of autistic people. It's an opportunity to learn more about autism and how to create a more inclusive community.

The Autism Community Workshop is being held during World Autism Month.



Venue

This workshop will be held at the Falcon Library and Community Centre on 22 April 2026 between 10am and 12.30pm.

The address is the corner of Cobblers Road and Flavia Street in Falcon.

The workshop will be in a meeting room in the library. There will be a sign showing me which room to go into.



Parking

If arriving by car, parking is available nearby. There is a car park at the rear of the library, accessible via Flavia Street in Falcon, as well as on-street parking at the front of the library.

Two ACROD parking bays are available in the rear car park.



Public transport

The workshop can be accessed by bus. There are bus stops near Falcon Library on Old Coast Road.

What will be discussed in the workshop

Participants will learn about the strengths and support needs of autistic people and explore ways to create more inclusive and welcoming community spaces.

The workshop will run for 2.5 hours and will be led by a facilitator from Neurominded, and will include a panel of local autistic people sharing their experiences.



Workshop participation

During the workshop, questions can be asked at any time.

There may be small group discussions, and participation is optional.



Refreshments

The workshop includes a light morning tea of fruit, cake and tea and coffee.



Sensory supports

During the workshop, a range of sensory supports will be available, including mindful colouring sheets, markers and fidget tools.

These resources are provided to support comfort, focus and participation, and can be used at any time throughout the workshop as needed.



Breakout spaces

If a break is needed during the workshop, quiet spaces are available in the library.

Participants are welcome to return to the workshop when they feel ready.



Assistance in the library

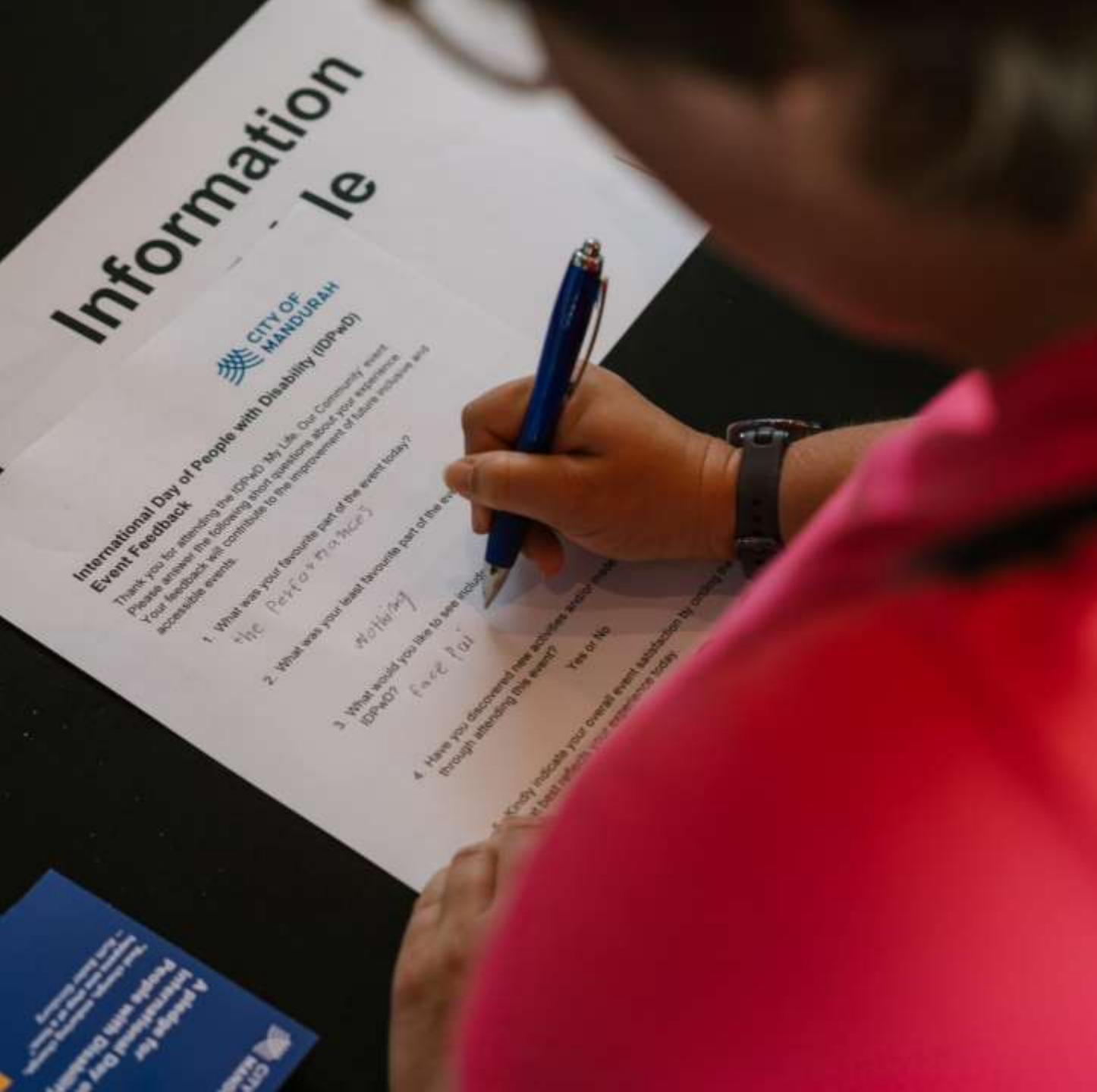
If assistance is needed while in the library, a library team member can be approached.
