The Himvanta forest of the Himalayas is inhabited by beautiful Kinnaree. These half-bird halfwoman are renowned for their singing and dancing.

Artist: Claire Bailey (Date Unknown)

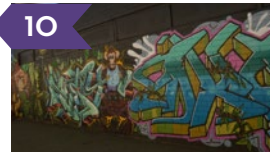
This work represents one of many drover's dogs that would have been left outside the inn while their owners quenched their thirst inside.

Artist: Jahne Rees & Rob McCulloch (2013)

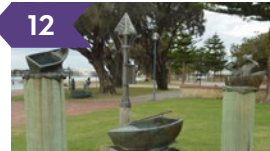
Elevated on jarrah poles, the aluminium canopy reflects the movement of water and marine life and casts interesting shadows on the pavement below.
